

# Glenview Fourth of July Committee seeks applicants

**T**he [Glenview](#) Fourth of July Committee is seeking applicants to help plan the village's largest annual community celebration, officials said.

The committee's focus is fundraising for Glenview's annual parade and fireworks display, which costs thousands of dollars and draws more than 25,000 people every year, according to a Glenview Park District press release. The committee also makes recommendations to park district officials about what activities to hold that day.

The long-standing committee is made up of volunteers from the Village of Glenview, Glenview Park District and local businesses, according to the release. The Glenview Park District Board of Commissioners determines and approves the committee's responsibilities, it said.

The committee meets from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. on the third Tuesday of each month, and members are expected to spend time outside of the meetings completing committee assignments and fundraising, according to the release.

Applicants must be a resident or work for a business located in the boundaries of the Glenview Park District, according to the release. Members are appointed to a three-year commitment, and are expected to attend each monthly meeting and “must be willing and eager to raise funds,” it said.

Previous experience with fundraising, committee or community service is required, according to the release.

The application can be found online at [www.glenview4th.org](http://www.glenview4th.org) and the deadline to apply is Jan. 12, 2018, according to the release.
