Park District awarded \$700K in state grants

The Glenview Park District scooped more than \$700,000 in state grants to support efforts to acquire and develop land for outdoor recreation, according to a release from the Park District.

At the start of February, Gov. J.B. Pritzker awarded more than \$28.9 million from Illinois' state-financed Open Space Land Acquisition and Development program to 89 park districts in the state.

"Investments in Illinois' local parks makes it easier for families and recreation enthusiasts to enjoy our state's beauty and help their communities thrive," Pritzker said when announcing the grants. "Parks projects will also create jobs, providing a boost to local economic development efforts in dozens of communities and spurring additional investment throughout the

state."

The Glenview Park District is set to receive \$400,000 from the OS-LAD grant and \$309,200 from the LAWCON grant, the release states.

The OS-LAD program is the federal equivalent of the LAWCON grant, from the Land & Water Conservation Fund. The OS-LAD and LAWCON programs are managed by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

The Glenview Park District is one of only two agencies to receive a grant from both program, and the \$709,200 it will receive ranks second behind only the Chicago Park District in the allotment of grant dollars.

"This is very exciting news," said Todd Price, superintendent of leisure services at the Park District. "With the help of state and federal dollars, the money we received from the referendum will

go even further."

The Park District plans to use the OS-LAD grant money to help fund the first phase of Historic Wagner Farm's Master Site Plan. The first phase of the plan calls for improving pathways to increase visitor flow and adding accessibility for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, according to the release.

The OS-LAD money will also help develop a multi-generational "Play-scape" with fun activities for adults and children, which will also have an educational component. The grant will cover nearly half of that cost.

The LAWCON funds will enable the Glenview Park District to leverage funding from the 2018 referendum on Open Space, which requires park districts to match dollar-for-dollar.

North Cook Intermediate Service Center (NCISC), handles inquiries of this nature."

Ironically, the current superintendent of Avoca schools, Dr. Kevin Jauch, is beginning a new position as executive director of NCISC on July 1, but for the time being, he responded to Winnetka

United's request.

"It doesn't make sense," Jauch said.

Jauch referred to the exemplary status of both districts, and the fact that households in other sections of Winnetka attend Glencoe and Kenilworth schools, though Winnetka United is not asking for those households to redraw their districts.

Jauch also discussed how Avoca provides

transportation for students who don't live close to their schools, and that the middle school Marie Murphy sits conveniently on the border between Wilmette and Winnetka.

Citing the many meandering boundary lines in the villages feeding into New Trier High School, Jauch cautioned against the disruptions that may result from redrawing longstanding borders.
